International Officer Supply Course (IOSCO) PIPELINE

International Officer Supply Course PIPELINE (2 MASLs total of 9 weeks)

International Officer Supply Course-Resident (IOSCO-R)

MASL P152011 **ECL 70**
Offered 2 times a year (summer and fall)
Duration: 6 weeks
Prerequisites: O-1 to O4 or equivalent
MUST ENROLL IN P152003

This course is designed for International Officers in grades O-1 to O-4, with waivers available for civilian employees. The course familiarizes students with the organizational structure of the U.S. Government, U.S. Navy, Naval Supply Systems Command (NAVSUP), Defense Logistics Agency (DLA), and U.S. Foreign Military Sales (FMS) processes.

Topics covered in the course include: material identification; catalog systems; FMS requisitioning procedures; acquisition procedures; allowance models; ship transfer procedures; Integrated Logistics Support (ILS); and Inventory Control Point (ICP) operations, with a focus on weapons systems support.

Students are introduced to a number of computer and web-based tools for customer support. These include: the Navy's International Programs E-Business Suite; the Security Cooperation Information Portal (SCIP); online Federal Logistics (FEDLOG) catalog; WEBFLIS; Asset Visibility of DLA stock; and Defense Reutilization Marketing Service (DRMS) for excess DoD stock.

The course content is flexible and is updated frequently to ensure current changes in procedures and systems are included in every class. Students will work with their own country's real time data in order to demonstrate methods used to improve logistics support. Instruction is modeled after training provided to U.S. DoD civilian and military personnel working in the supply and maintenance communities.

International Officer Supply Course-Travel (IOSCO-T)

Offered 2 times a year (summer and fall)
Duration: 3 weeks
Prerequisites: O-1 to O4 or equivalent
MUST COMPLETE P152011

During this 3-week travel course the class visits a number of operational commands for additional seminars, briefings, and tours of logistics facilities to reinforce the theory and practices learned in IOSCO - Resident Coursework.

Typically the class travels from Newport to Norfolk, and Richmond, VA; Washington, DC; Philadelphia and Mechanicsburg, PA. Activities visited include: NAVSUP Fleet Logistics Center, Norfolk; NAVSUP Global Logistics Support Operations Center, Norfolk; NAVSUP Weapons System Support – Maritime (M) and Foreign Directorate (OF); DLA Aviation; DLA Distribution Center – Susquehanna; and various other flight line and waterfront supply organizations.

The Visit to NAVSUP Weapon System Support (OF) in Philadelphia affords the students an opportunity to meet with subject matter experts in Navy FMS cases, meet their Country Program Managers, Security Assistance Field Representatives, and receive briefs on current business practices of NAVSUP-OF concerning FMS support.. Students return to Newport for graduation and departure



Field Studies Program (FSP)

In addition to the technical training conducted at the Navy Supply Corps School, our Field Studies Program (FSP) is a vital part of the international students' overall education experience. Participation in FSP activities helps students gain a better understanding of the United States, its beliefs, and the people that make it unique. We provide visits that focus on objectives that highlight the principles of the United Nations Universal Declaration of Human Rights and U.S. democratic principles.



We want the individual to make their own judgments, and hope to dispel some of the myths and misconceptions they may have about the United States. The escorts and instructors engage in frank discussions with the students based on their observations, and are willing to discuss the flaws as well as the successes in our society, and the paths we are taking to improve as a country. We hope that our international students will return home with a positive experience, and share these with people in their home countries.

Another goal of the FSP is to give the international student exposure to every-day family life in the U.S. If desired, we pair up our students with a local sponsor group or family that can assist them in adjusting to their new environment. We ask sponsor families to include the student in some of their normal activities, such as shopping, cookouts, and trips to local sites. Interacting with the community gives our students a true representation of the U.S. and greatly enhances their training experience.
